## **Qualifications and Levels**

 Most qualifications available in Ireland fit into the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ), which divides qualifications into ten levels. Entry at Level 1 is at the bottom and Level 10 is at the top.




The levels are based on nationally agreed standards of **knowledge**, **skill**, and **competence**; i.e. what an individual is expected to know, understand and be able to do following successful completion of a process of learning.

The system of levels is arranged like a ladder. Completion of one level usually means you are able to move up to the next, or jump several if you commit to an agreed number of years study.

### Progression

- For example, it is possible for you to progress from a good honours Leaving Cert (Level 5) directly to an Honours Bachelors Degree (Level 8) if you commit to the three/four years (sometimes more) of study required.
- You can choose to move one step at a time by selecting a Level 6 Higher Certificate in an Institute of Technology, then a Level 7 Ordinary Degree, and eventually a Level 8 Honours Degree in the same or a different institution.
- Progression Routes: The National Framework helps to improve access (entry) to education and training. It allows you to transfer and progress within and between courses and colleges nationally and internationally.








There are four types of award in the National Framework of Qualifications:

Major Awards: are the principal class of awards made at a level

- Minor Awards: are for partial completion of the outcomes for a Major Award
- Supplemental Awards: are for learning that is additional to a Major Award
  - Special Purpose Awards: are for relatively narrow or purpose-specific achievement







#### Six good reasons why you should take qualifications seriously:

- #1. To give yourself a **choice of jobs**: increasingly many low-skilled jobs are being exported to foreign countries, or being automated by machines. As a result, there are few low-skilled jobs left to choose from.
- #2. To **get promoted**: it is difficult to move from unskilled labour to skilled labour without actually acquiring any skills. Qualifications are designed to give you the skills you need to move up.
- #3. To make money: on average, there is a huge pay gap between people with qualifications and people without. The highest paid jobs are usually those which take a lot of skill, and qualifications are there to teach those skills.
- #4. To prove your competence: qualifications are proof that you are capable of mastering a body of knowledge, and have the skills which employers value. Not only does a qualification show that you are good at what you do; it suggests that you are able to become even better!
- #5. To show **commitment**: your investment of time and effort in a qualification shows employers that you are serious about what you want to do, and that any further investments they make in your training will not go to waste.
- #6. To **enjoy yourself**: learning about something which you enjoy is fulfilling, boosts your self-confidence, and improves self-awareness.

#### **Qualification levels:**

"On the job" training: The job requires a low level of training given as part of the job.
Level 5/6 Certificate: The job requires a post-secondary vocational award or certificate.
Apprenticeship: The job requires apprenticeship training of at least 4 years.
Ordinary Bachelors Degree: The job requires at least a Level 7 Bachelors Degree
Honours Bachelors Degree: The job requires at least an Level 8 Bachelors Degree
Postgraduate Award: The job requires more than an Honours Bachelors Degree.

#### Wage levels:



Low: Earning €20,000 or less per year. Average: Earning €20,000 – €35,000 per year. High: Earning €35,000 – €50,000 per year. Very High: Earning more than €50,000 per year.
